One of the pleasures and wonders of art appreciation is getting up close and really examining the piece's intricacy and complexity. THE GREAT FLAG FLAP

It's been 20 years. TWENTY years! How can it be 20 years since Owen Sound raised its first Pride flag? It was the basic six-colour rainbow-striped version then, and what we now call The Great Flag Flap had quite an impact on City Hall and the people who live here.

In June, 2005, the Elementary Teachers Federation (ETFO) Bluewater Local Human Rights Committee asked City Council to raise the Pride flag. Mayor and Council agreed. On the morning of June 24, we expected a brief and quiet ceremony on the front steps of City Hall. It started that way, but a local radio announcer noticed and went on air about "something going on at City Hall…better get down there." And people came in droves. There were 80+ supporters and a small, mostly silent protest group complete with the quasi-religious signs we've come to expect. Brief words were spoken by me and the acting mayor, the flag went up, and then we all went to work.

The next day the proverbial shit hit the fan. Letters to the editor of the Sun Times ran for a few weeks – some

pro, some con. The City's flag policy was changed. No, it was completely locked down so that only a very few governmental flags could ever be flown. Things stayed that way for 12 years despite a quiet and sustained effort to get several Councils to see the reasons for raising flags of all community groups, but the flag policy wasn't changed until 2017 and it's a really solid, inclusive one now. Coincidentally "/sarc" that was the year after Owen Sound Police Service raised the Pride flag at the police station. City Hall was closed for renovations then, so for a couple of years the flag was raised at the Bayshore arena instead. But the renovation plans at City Hall changed: they decided to add a community flagpole around the corner of City Hall, and raise all community flags there.

Does that feel to anyone else a bit like being shoved off to the side? And the flagpole is relatively close to City Hall, flanked by trees that have grown up around it, so flags don't catch a lot of breeze or attention. But the Pride flag is raised there, and so are many others throughout the year. And that's a good thing.



SUSTAINABLE TOURISM SUPPORTING CONSERVATION ON THE PENINSULA

In 2018, the Bruce Peninsula Biosphere Association came up with the idea of developing a tour company that would offer excursions on the Saugeen Bruce Peninsula. The idea behind this venture — later named EcoAdventures — was to encourage local, sustainable tourism; instil visitors and residents alike with a passion for conservation in the beautiful and unique spaces of the Peninsula; and funnel proceeds back to the projects that the Biosphere Association undertakes. Since that time, EcoAdventures has been hosting day hikes, night hikes, caving tours, snowshoe treks, fatbiking adventures, canoeing experiences, skiing tours, overnight events, and escape rooms — all in support of the fragile and precious ecosystems of the Saugeen Bruce.

Sustainability is at the core of EcoAdventures' operations. Local guides lead tours away from higher-traffic destinations such as the Grotto except in the off-season, and shoulder season experiences are offered to encourage visits during quieter times of year. EcoAdventures also partners with other organizations such as Bruce Peninsula National Park and Cape Croker Park to deliver relevant and impactful programming all year long.

Upcoming adventures include Cyprus Lake Forest Escape, an escape room experience at Bruce Peninsula National Park. This hour-long challenge for teams of 4-6 will have participants cracking codes, searching for clues, and racing against the clock.

Launching this year is a brand new nocturnal escape experience hosted by Bayside Astronomy — a must for stargazers and puzzlers alike.



Brave the Caves returns in June at Greig's Caves. This is a perennial favourite for all ages, but especially popular with kids. Take a deep dive



into the history of the ancient Georgian Bay sea caves and explore the incredible hidden caverns of the Peninsula.

Following on the heels of the extremely popular Owl Prowls (February to April), EcoAdventures will be offering night hikes throughout the spring and summer. These nocturnal tours are an exploration in the nighttime ecology of the Peninsula's forests, wetlands, and shore-lines.

THE SPACE BETWEEN CULTURES, FILLED WITH STARS AND SHEPHERD'S PIE

Last summer, I started seeing posts popping up in local social media groups: '*Host Families Needed for International Students*.' I scrolled past, then paused. Could we do it again? Should we? You may have seen them. The notices come out each year around the same time – late spring, into summer – as MLI Homestay seeks out host residences for students from Japan, Argentina, Sweden, and elsewhere. Each is looking for their own great Canadian learning experience.

Our family had hosted an exchange student from Australia for a semester about a decade ago. It was a great experience. But the kids were younger. We didn't seem as busy with work back then. This student placement was for the entire school year. One son's already off at university, it's all so different now. But, but, but.

And yet I couldn't stop thinking about it.

So I asked my husband and sons, what do you think? Everyone was surprisingly receptive. We reached out to MLI Homestay and were put in touch with local coordinator, Adriene Mackenzie. More than just an advocate for the program, she's also an experienced host who has provided stays for six students over the last eight years. "I keep in contact with the students, and enjoy seeing how their time in Canada has helped shape them into amazing adults," Adriene says.

It's a great opportunity to learn about a different culture and see our wonderful area through fresh eyes, she told us. Indeed, this has been one of the biggest bonuses of our experience this past school year: you get to see Grey-Bruce through fresh eyes.

Our student, Taku, is from Tokyo, Japan. From the beginning, his sense of wonder and awe was catching. Driving home with the family one night shortly after he arrived, Taku was wowed by the stars he could see from the car. We pulled onto a sideroad, drove about halfway down, and parked to go for a walk.

Taku was floored. He's seen the moon, he told us, but never so many stars. There's too much light pollution in Tokyo. Since then, he's been out to a Sidewalk Astronomy demonstration, witnessed the Northern Lights, and stayed up late spotting meteors in the backyard, all right here in Owen Sound.

We've gone hiking at Inglis Falls and Jones Falls, tobogganing at Harrison Park, and skating at the rec centre. Cheered on the Attack and lamented the Leafs. We've been to ball games and shows in Toronto, and toured behind the falls at Niagara Falls. Family friends even took Taku ice fishing on

Lake Simcoe.

And don't worry – it's not all go-go-go. While trips and activities are fun, they're not mandatory, and MLI Homestay offers group trips the students can join if they'd like to explore more of Canada during their time here. Host families don't need to pack an agenda with activities for their guest. The real magic is how students are incorporated into everyday life.

Maybe Saturday mornings at the Farmers' Market are part of your routine, or Solidarity Sundays at the Harmony Centre. Take your student along. Introduce them to optional local activities. Taku loves the gym and soccer, for example, so he got a YMCA membership and joined a few local leagues. He's enjoyed meeting up with friends at Dairy Queen, Pokemon raids at Harrison Park, and learning how to cook poutine and Shepherd's Pie at home. These are just part of everyday life for Canadian teens – and that's precisely what makes it all such an exceptional experience for an international student.

Now, with just a short time left in the school year, we're making the most of our time together. Before Taku returns to the hustle and big-city pace of Tokyo, we'll get a few swims in at Sauble Beach, enjoy Harrison Park some more, and spend three nights on Flowerpot Island as volunteer lighthouse keepers. And while we're packing in the fun, I find myself quietly taking stock of how much this experience has enriched our lives, too. Yes, being a host family is a big change, and it's definitely a commitment. But man, is it ever a lot of fun.

MLI Homestay is now looking for host families for exchange students from Japan and Spain, beginning in the fall (September 2025 to June 2026). Two of them will be attending St. Mary's High School in Owen Sound. Remuneration is provided to host families. To learn more and fill out your host family application, visit MLIHomestay.com.





FLOWERPOT ISLAND REMINDS US WHAT'S WORTH PROTECTING

The first time I stepped onto Flowerpot Island, I was a kid...wide-eyed, mudsmeared, and certain I was the bravest explorer ever to set foot on that stretch of shoreline. Decades later, I still feel that same sense of wonder every time I visit.

Flowerpot Island: Then and Now is a practical guide I have written for visitors, but it's also a reflection on what this place has meant to people over time — and what it can still teach us if we're paying attention. The towering sea stacks are what most people come to see, but there's far more here once you start looking closer.

Flowerpot Island is within the traditional territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, whose people are part of the Anishinaabek, the broader cultural and linguistic group that includes the Ojibway, Odawa, and Pottawatomi Nations. Their relationship with this land and water stretches back thousands of years. That history, and its continued presence today, deserves space in how we understand _____

and experience this place. With guidance from an Elder, the book's cultural history chapter honours this long-standing connection and invites readers to reflect on the responsibilities we all share as guests here.

This uniquely beautiful place is part of a larger story, written into the limestone of the Niagara Escarpment and passed down through generations. Long before the lighthouse was built, these waters were home to the Saugeen Ojibway Nation. Archaeological sites on the island, such as the Glen site, are reminders of that enduring connection.

The settler history of the island is more recent. The lightstation, once home to generations of keepers and their families, offers a window into a life shaped by isolation and resilience. Thanks to the ongoing work of Friends of the Bruce District Parks Association volunteers, the lightkeepers' dwelling is open as a living museum. It's a rare chance to step inside a preserved piece of Great Lakes history.

grown rapidly in the last decade. With that growth comes both opportunity and pressure: on trails, on ecosystems, and on the quiet experience many visitors seek. Flowerpot Island: Then and Now is meant to help visitors prepare, understand, and tread lightly. Whether you're planning a visit or simply curious about what lies beyond the shoreline, this book is an invitation to see Flowerpot Island more fully, not just for what it offers us, but for what it asks of us in return. 

GREY GALLERY – SEVEN YEARS AND COUNTING

The Victoria Day weekend in May 2018 was the date we opened the doors of Grey Gallery. We had purchased the historic building in downtown Owen Sound in January, and had begun renovations so we could make a residence on the second floor, but that summer we lived in our trailer at Sauble, and greatly enjoyed our picturesque and peaceful commute.

At the time we opened, there was a handful of other commercial galleries downtown in addition to the Tom Thomson Gallery, and it felt good to be joining an exciting and vibrant arts community. Although our initial idea had been to showcase the work of Gallery co-owner John Laughlin, along with some collectables and books, we soon found there was considerable interest from local artists in exhibiting with us.

That fall of 2018 we held the first of a series of exhibitions by Raquell Yang. Over the course of the next seven years we have curated and exhibited the work of more than 30 artists in solo or dual shows, as well as 200+ artists in juried or invitational group shows. The majority of the artists are regional, and it has been a privilege to make the work of so many talented and creative people available for the public to view. The ability to browse, to chat with the curators, and to meet the artists in person, is valuable and cannot be replicated online.

Although we hosted a few workshops early on, we soon realized that other venues including the fledgling GBArts were doing a much better job of that, and we restricted our efforts to life drawing. From the fall of 2018 until now with only minor interruptions, we have run weekly uninstructed drop-in sessions, thanks to a wonderfully talented group of models.

Another initiative that started the first year was ArtWalk. Due to the efforts of Maryann Thomas at Ginger Press who does the bulk of the organizing and promotion, we have carried on ever since, with some modifications due to COVID. Each year we have had about ten participating venues, and it has become an anticipated event in June.

Grey Gallery welcomes collaborations with other businesses and organizations and the annual Lunar New Year exhibition is a good example. When the exhibition could no longer be shown at the Tom Thomson Gallery we began to host it and it has always been a fun experience, giving both hobby and professional artists a chance to participate.

In 2024 we collaborated with Amelia Kraemer, the

organizer of the Owen Sound Community Artist Studio Tour, and exhibited the work of all 30+ artists participating in the tour. This September we will be collaborating with Amelia again in connection with the Canadian Encaustic Conference. We are excited to be exhibiting the work of an elite group of national and international artists who are participating in the conference.

Over the years, we have sharpened our focus on the type of work we exhibit, and, for the most part, our mandate now is figurative work and works on paper. The interest in paper also began the first autumn we were open, with Washi Weekend, and that event resulted in Grey Gallery becoming a reseller for the Japanese Paper Place, making quality Japanese decorative and art paper available to artists and craftspeople in our region.

Grey Garden is another aspect of our presence in downtown Owen Sound. We purchased the vacant lot adjoining the gallery so we would have parking, but there was no doubt that it was an eyesore. As the site of a former fire it consisted of rubble and gravel and was used as a thoroughfare between 2nd and 3rd Avenues.

In the late fall of 2019 after an unexpected rebuild of our south wall we had a beautiful new surface just crying out for a something, and Raquell Yang stepped in and created the amazing 50-foot mural entitled Transformations. We decided to continue to transform it into a welcoming downtown space, creating some plantings, adding outdoor sculpture, and making it available as an event venue. During the summer of 2020, under the direction of Thomas Dean, we added fencing, excavated beds and planted trees and perennials.

The garden has hosted many community concerts and events, and continues to be a work in progress. Last summer we worked with Sound Outdoors to add a small rock and gravel garden, and this spring we will be acquiring additional sculptures. We are always interested in collaborating with individuals or groups who are looking for a downtown outdoor venue.

So, despite having to cope with building challenges, COVID, a recent flood, and downtown decline, we are still here, with plans for outstanding exhibitions right through to the end of the year. Whether you are an artist, an art lover, or just someone who is curious about what we do, we hope you will stop by the gallery and garden next time you are downtown. Help us to keep Owen Sound as an art destination in our region and beyond.

Not everyone grows up knowing their calling, but for Andrew Russell, founder of Down North Garlic Company, destiny came knocking unexpectedly. FABULOUS FESTIVAL OF FRINGE FILM

Founded in 2002, the Fabulous Festival of Fringe Film was established by the Grey Zone Collec-tive (GZC) as a way to bring contemporary and unconventional arts into the public realm. The GZC was established to collaborate with and showcase arts in rural settings, which are alternative, unconventional and exceptional. 

GOLD OF ANOTHER KIND – THE LOST LEGACY OF GEORGIAN BAY AN EVENING WITH ALLEN SMUTYLO

Governor General's nominee and award-winning artist Allen Smutylo's new book, *Gold of Another Kind – The Lost Legacy of Georgian Bay*, is a historical, as well as a personal, account of the once staggering quality and quantity of three natural resources that were native to Georgian Bay waters and vicinity. A special event featuring a book talk by Allen, hosted by The Ginger Press, will take place at the Rumpus Room in Owen Sound at 7:00pm on Wednesday June 25.

Based in Tobermory for many years, Allen's writing and artwork have focused on experiences around Georgian Bay as well as some of the most remote places in the world including the Canadian Arctic as well as the west, east, and south coasts of Greenland, Iceland, Alaska, Labrador, the Amazon, Antarctica, the Himalaya, the Ganges, Baja, Rajasthan, Patagonia, West Africa, Morocco and Mongolia.

In his new book, Allen reaches back into Georgian Bay history through the memoirs and journals of early explorers, fur traders, Jesuits, shanty men, river runners, lumber barons, commercial fishermen, and Native accounts, to uncover a story of an unbridled frenzy, driven by obsessive greed for the 'unclaimed' resources of a virgin land. However, as he points out, this coveting and exploiting a natural resource is hardly unique to Georgian Bay. Although the details are different, what happened here, has happened, and continues to happen, almost everywhere. By better understanding this, the author hopes to give readers a clearer perspective on how to navigate



the future. From his experiences in Newfoundland, Antarctica and West Africa, he concludes that the human appetite for abusing an 'open' resource isn't confined to any one area or people, or to the distant past.





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
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
